Dear Friends,

Saint Matthew's has started the New Year with great expectations for the future. I say this, because the concept is embodied in the vows of ordination said with, and for, Father Charles. Specifically in the acclamation we shared in:

We will.

You see, we have vowed to place ourselves, our parish in the middle of a new ministry. Yes, there is certainly an instructional aspect to this. Are your gifts and talents being appropriately put to use to proclaim the Kingdom of Heaven?

In the coming months we will explore many new things together, while holding true to the core message of the Gospel, proclaimed in the Prayer for Spiritual Growth, as it is lived out in our parish. We will preach, teach, heal, and make disciples and we will share Christ with everyone we meet.

Yes, I said Snow!

We got some snow both Thursday night and Saturday morning (Jan 19 and 21). I believe we got about 3 or 4 inches here. It's very different here, rather than the usual pre-snow scramble to the grocery store for the typical bread and milk, it's really odd for me to see so much snow on the ground and cars going around in their usual manner- although a bit slower- but there are just as many people out and about as there usually are and rather than getting up all the snow, there are just paths shoveled in it so everyone can walk through. Stepping off of curbs is a little awkward, not just because I'm wearing my winter boots, but because there's snow there as well. I'm on my Sabbath right now (from Sunday evening through the entire day Monday) and I'm going to go for a walk with Doc tomorrow. We're not going to wander too far because I'm not really comfortable walking in this much snow yet, so we'll see how that goes.

So I can say that winter has finally arrived. We've had a very mild time of it until January. Last week it was 12 degrees and that is Cold! I see on the weather that you guys have had very mild weather, I admit, when I see the 39 degree for a low, I scoff- our high wasn't even that high today! It didn't get above freezing.

All that aside though, I really like it up here. I'll be honest, should I ever find myself with the option of moving here one day, and I really do think I'd do it. I came here with a lot of ideas of what I thought this place was going to be like and while I do know my situation is atypical with moving directly into a community of friends, I have found the people up here, to be just like people everywhere else. Sure they don't tend to stop and ask if I need any help like a lot of southerners do, but once I indicate to someone that I do need help, generally directions to somewhere if I've gotten turned around, they are just as willing to get me where I need to go. I, on more than one occasion have had a police officer walk me past some construction and get me re-oriented in the direction I need to go, that's amazing.

The guesthouse has been open for two weeks so far, the Brothers went up to Emmory House for a retreat with Frank Griswald former Presiding Bishop) for about 4 or 5 days in early January. So, we were in charge while they were gone, they were a bit nervous, but the monastery is still standing and we had done everything they asked of us, including praying the offices together. That was a lot of fun; I came up with the liturgy for Morning and Evening Prayer on Epiphany. I really enjoyed doing that, I was surprised at how much I enjoyed it, thinking about finding things that tied certain themes together, or simply going with some of the prayers that were favorites of mine.

Another interesting note, Wednesday the 18th, was officially our half way point. That is So weird. I mentioned that to one of the Brothers and his reaction was similar to my own when I found that out, we only just got here. We all have been doing a lot of thinking about "What's next?" I think some things are happening but I'm not going to talk about that too much just yet. I'm fairly certain that I'll be coming home as I originally intended, what happens next, that's up to God.

I had a realization the other day. There's a promise within one of the services for Ordination where the respond and promises to "persevere in prayer". I honestly think I am beginning to understand what that means. There are some days when I just don't want to go to church again, we've done it three times already, and can't I just skip this one? Then I stop for a moment and think about why it is that I am here. Sure there's the space for discernment and the guidance along with it and the formational aspects in our class each week with a Brother and in our continued training in liturgy, I know how a thurable works, look out, I'm going to talk them into letting me be thureffer eventually- but the main reason I am here is to cultivate my relationship with God.

Relationships are hard, sometimes you do things you don't necessarily want to in order to cultivate a relationship, going to a restaurant you really don't like, but the other person absolutely loves. I've decided that, at least for me, prayer, and church and all these things are about simply showing up, even if you don't want to and would rather be taking a nap, or sleeping in- as I have admittedly done once or twice- but you know that there is something bigger than sitting in the chapel, half-awake and not quite able to see clearly yet, you are there because God is there.

Yes, God is everywhere, but it's about being intentional about it, at least for me anyway, if I am not intentional about doing certain things, I won't do them, every week on a certain day, I do laundry, one because I run out of clothes in about a week and a half, but two, it's about taking pride in the situation I find myself in, and maybe I'm wrong but I would think God would want us to take pride in our relationship as well.

I could go on for pages but I have to leave room for others. I'm working on booking a flight for the week of March 19, coming home on either the 19th in the evening or the early afternoon of the 20th and staying until at least the 26th, so hopefully we all can sit down and chat, if you want to of course.

The Curate's Corner: An Exploration of Our Faith

Christopher Price raises two very interesting questions in this month's Curate's Corner.

If we started keeping track of time when Jesus was born wouldn't his birthday be January 1?

This seemingly simple question has a rather complex answer. There is a marked difference between the way the secular world and the Church mark time. This difference in time keeping, or calendars, accounts for the difference. January 1st is the day in which the new secular year begins. So, last month on December 31st/January 1st the year switched from 2011 to 2012. However, the Church new year began much earlier on November 27, 2011.

Each year on the first Sunday of Advent the Church's year begins anew as we prepare to receive the Christ Child at Christmas and prepare to receive Jesus at his Second Coming with power and great glory. This changing of the year is done to mark the new cycle in the liturgical and spiritual life of the Church as we once again get ready for Jesus to come at Christmas. The differences between the secular and Church calendars account for the difference between the beginning of the new year but what about the date of Jesus' birth.

Should not the Church year start with the birth of Jesus at Christmas? The answer to this is two fold. Advent is the beginning of the Church year because with the beginning of the season of Advent we start our preparations to receive Jesus anew at Christmas. The Sunday before the start of Advent, the Feast of Christ the King, is the culmination of the Christian story and church year. Secondly, there was an accounting of time prior to the birth of Jesus so his birth does not mark the beginning of time keeping.

There are two eras of time: Before Christ (BC) and Anno Domini, in the year of our Lord, (AD). Jesus' birth did not mark the beginning of time or our accounting of it but does cause a rupture in our reckoning of time. Every year after Jesus' birth has been one of the "years of our Lord." Thus, this year is the 2012th year of our Lord.

What did Jesus say or do to remove the requirements of Levitical law?

Jesus did not come to abolish the Law but to fulfill it (Matthew 5:17-19) and by fulfilling the law he took upon himself all the transgressions of world. We who could not keep the law, and were therefore unrighteous, were made righteous by Jesus who perfectly kept the law and offered himself as "a perfect sacrifice for the whole world" (BCP 362). In doing this, Jesus has fulfilled the law so that through him we can stand before God and be reckoned as righteous.

Jesus fulfillment of the Law does not remove all responsibility from us to lead holy lives. Rather, Jesus lived and died as one of us so that we might live as God's sons and daughters forever. Through our own dedication to leading a holy life, and the grace of God made available both through the sacrifice of Christ upon the cross and through the sacraments offered by his Church, we are able to live as God's sons and daughters.

I can't help it. I have a romantic heart. The first love song I learned and sang was when I was about three years old. It goes like this; "Jesus loves me this I know for the Bible tells me so" – It's still high on my list of hits. Decades ago when I was a child parents did not tell children every time they turned around, "I love you." Now don't misunderstand me, I think its important that the people we love know it. But beyond saying it, Love is something you do! The need is there on both sides to give it and to receive it. Nothing bounces back so swiftly. But only, as it is generously given with no expectation of a return.

Of course February's love focus is of romance – roses and chocolates – sweet words and candlelight – proposals – like millions mine came with a heart shaped box of caramel nougats (I had that box for years). Did I mention I'm also very sentimental? But really, doesn't love make your world go 'round? Do you know a truly lonely person? I think they cannot trust in "love." Perhaps they never experienced or could understand God's unconditional love.

The message of the New Testament from the birth of Jesus, the only begotten Son to "Father, forgive them they know not what they do," is love. Countless examples of true love down thru the ages exist in the minds of us all. Sacrifices and heroic acts remind us what truly is "true love."

From time to time I've shared some of the wonderful writings on love. I have a journal chock-full and running over. So here is my Valentine for my beloved St. Matthew's family.

Definition of Love

"Love is by far the most important thing of all. It is the Golden Gate of Paradise. Pray for the understanding of love, and meditate upon it daily. It casts out fear. It is the fulfilling of the law. It covers a multitude of sins. Love is absolutely invincible. There is no difficulty that enough love will not conquer; no disease, enough love will not heal; no door enough love will not open; no gulf that enough love will not bridge; no wall enough love will not throw down; no sin that enough love will not redeem. It makes no difference how deeply seated may be the trouble, how hopeless the outlook, how muddled the tangle, how great the mistake; a sufficient realization of love will dissolve it all.
